



AMENDMENT NO.1

TO

GRANT NO. G1400195

BETWEEN THE

STATE OF WASHINGTON DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY

AND

CITY OF REDMOND

PURPOSE: To amend the Agreement between the Department of Ecology, hereinafter referred to as 'ECOLOGY' or "DEPARTMENT" and the City of Redmond, hereinafter referred to as 'RECIPIENT'.

WHEREAS, the Coordinated Prevention Grant funds as originally allocated to the RECIPIENT will be better utilized if they are redistributed across the grant tasks,

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED the agreement is amended as follows:

- 1) Task 1: Recycling Collection Events – Residential: **BUDGET:** The state share for this task increases by \$5,515.50 from \$23,400 to \$28,915.50.
- 2) Task 1: Recycling Collection Events – Residential: **SCOPE:** The original grant agreement did not assign sufficient funds to this task to cover all of the activities and outcomes listed. This amendment will allow ECOLOGY to reimburse RECIPIENT for more of the costs that it would have otherwise had to absorb. The outcomes remain the same.
- 3) Task 2: Commercial Education and Outreach – Waste Reduction and Recycling: **BUDGET:** The state share for this task is reduced by \$6,040.50 from \$52,882 to \$46,841.50.
- 4) Task 2: Commercial Education and Outreach – Waste Reduction and Recycling: **SCOPE:** Scope remains unchanged because the RECIPIENT is able to complete the project for less money.
- 5) Task 3: Public Education and EcoKit Distribution: **BUDGET:** The state share for this task increases by \$6,908.08 from \$9,789 to \$16,697.08.
- 6) Task 3: Public Education and EcoKit Distribution: **SCOPE:** This amendment adds the following language to the Task Description for Task 3:

An additional outreach via a pledge-driven kit will occur as a result of a partnership with the Cities of Kirkland and Bothell, and the hauler Waste Management. Through the education program called Waste Watchers, the RECIPIENT will highlight proper placement of materials in curbside carts, the availability of different cart sizes/prices, and most importantly, waste reduction. Reusable lunch kits are the reward residents may receive for taking an online pledge to use the kit to pack lunches with reusable containers. The website also offers links to additional lunch waste reduction tips (www.getcartsmart.com).

- 7) Task 3: Public Education and EcoKit Distribution: SCOPE: The Outcome Statement for Task 3 is changed to the following:

Outcome Statement: Over the 24-month grant period, the RECIPIENT expects to contact 20,000 residents and distribute over 325 EcoKits and approximately 800 lunch kits. The lunch kits will reduce packaging and food waste by an estimated 40 tons.

- 8) Task 4: Battery Recycling – Residential Drop off Sites: BUDGET: The state share for this task decreases by \$6,383.08 from \$13,500 to \$7,116.92.

- 9) Task 4: Battery Recycling – Residential Drop-off Sites: SCOPE: The Outcome Statement for Task 4 is changed to the following:

Outcome Statement: Over the 24-month grant period, the RECIPIENT expects citizens to recycle approximately 8.5 tons of household batteries at the fixed sites listed above (tonnage adjusted per the library's discontinued participation in fall of 2014).

- 10) The maximum eligible cost and state share for this agreement stays the same.

- 11) The following term is added to the General Terms and Conditions:

“ECOLOGY’s ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to completion or expiration date of this agreement, ECOLOGY, at its sole discretion, may elect to terminate the agreement, in whole or part, or renegotiate the agreement, subject to new funding limitations or conditions. ECOLOGY may also elect to suspend performance of the agreement until ECOLOGY determines the funding insufficiency is resolved. ECOLOGY may exercise any of these options with no notification restrictions.”

- 12) The revised budget for this agreement is as follows:
